Illuminated manuscripts were hand-made books, usually on Christian scripture or practice, produced in Western Europe between c. 500-c. 1600 CE. They are so called because of the use of gold and silver which illuminates the text and accompanying illustrations.

Illuminated manuscript. Most medieval manuscripts, illuminated or not, were written on parchment (most commonly of calf, sheep, or goat skin), but most manuscripts important enough to illuminate were written on the best quality of parchment, called vellum.

Other examples of illuminated manuscripts include the Book of Durrow (produced in the British Isles around 650 AD), the Lindisfarne Gospels (produced on an island off the northeast English coast around 700 AD), and perhaps the most famous, the Book of Kells (produced in Ireland in the 800s AD).
